

Bela Bartok Services Set

Services for Bela Bartok, distinguished Hungarian composer and pianist, will be held at 2 p. m. tomorrow at the Universal Funeral Chapel, Lexington ave. and E. 52nd st.

Mr. Bartok, 64, who resided at 309 W. 57th st., was regarded by many critics as the leading authority on folk music of his own country and adjacent nations. He was a prolific composer and his works included the opera, "Prince Bluebeard's Castle," many orchestral pieces and chamber music, comprising six string quartets.

Born in Hungary, he studied at the Royal Academy of Music in Budapest. In 1927 he came to America for the first time and was heard that year at Carnegie Music Hall. He gave many concerts down through the years and in April, 1940, participated in a program given in his honor by the League of Composers at the Museum of Modern Art.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Edith Bartok, and two sons, Bela and Peter Bartok.

P. M'Goodwin, Diplomat-Editor

LYNCHBURG, Va., Sept. 27 (AP)—Funeral services for President Buford McGoodwin, 65, former United States Minister to Venezuela and newspaperman, were to be held late today from his Alis Vista, Va., home.

Born in Princeton, Ky., he started work as a reporter for the Louisville Courier-Journal after graduating from Centre College. Later he became managing editor of the Joplin Globe, Joplin, Mo., and then held editorial positions with the Ohio Sun, Columbus; Commercial Tribune, Cincinnati; and Oklahoman, Oklahoma City.

Mr. McGoodwin was American Minister to Venezuela from 1913 until 1922 under an appointment by President Woodrow Wilson. He then entered the oil business in Latin America.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Jean C. McGoodwin, and a son, Preston Buford McGoodwin, of White Plains, N. Y.

Beer - Hofmann, Playwright, Dies

Dr. Richard Beer-Hofmann, 79, Vienna poet and playwright, died of pneumonia yesterday at his home, 312 Cathedral pkwy. Funeral rites will be held at 10 a. m. tomorrow at the Free Synagogue, 40 W. 68th st.

Dr. Beer-Hofmann, who was forced by the Nazis to flee his native Austria in 1939, was recognized as a leader in literary circles in Vienna for many years prior to World War II.

He was frequently host in his 43-room home in Vienna to such outstanding personages as Arthur Schnitzler, Franz Werfel and Max Reinhardt.

Among his works are two plays, "The Count of Charolais" and "Jacob's Dream," which were frequently performed in Germany and Austria.

While at Zurich, Switzerland, to which country he fled without his wife, Mrs. Paula Beer-Hofmann, the latter died. He then came to America, and on March 14 last, was sworn in as a citizen of the United States.

Since his arrival in New York Dr. Beer-Hofmann has produced two works, "Poems" and "Paula," a tribute to his wife.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Miriam Lens and Mrs. Naomi Beer-Hofmann, with whom he resided here.

J. Korngold, Music Critic

—Arrangements were to be completed today for the funeral of Dr. Julius Korngold, 84, retired dean of European music critics, who came here from Vienna in 1938 to join his son, Erich Wolfgang Korngold, the widely-known composer and conductor.

Dr. Korngold was the last of the pre-Hitler artistic triumvirate in Vienna, which included Max Reinhardt and Franz Werfel. He wrote the score of Max Reinhardt's production of "Midsummer Night's Dream," and also the original score for the motion picture, "Robin Hood."

Surviving, besides his composer son, are his wife, Mrs. Josephine Korngold, residing in Hollywood, and another son, John, Vienna orchestra leader.
